The Colon Challenge

n 28th May 2014 a group of cyclists started the gruelling Colon Challenge, ending at lunchtime on 31st May outside the Arsenal football stadium. Bowel cancer patient, Paul Bouscarle, organised the 280 mile ride after undergoing two operations at St. Mark's Hospital in August 2013 and January 2014. Paul was joined by 15 other cyclists and they have raised an amazing total of over £35,000.

The Colonoscopic Surgical Centre:

Setting the Future Standard of Care for Minimally Invasive Surgery

Introduction

Bowel cancer remains a public health concern, being the second most common cancer in the UK. There is a real need to develop more effective treatments.

Bowel cancer can be prevented via colonoscopy, a tried and tested method to find and remove pre-cancerous and cancerous polyps. It is a highly skilled procedure and a challenging technique to master, but The Wolfson Unit for Endoscopy at St. Mark's is dedicated to advancing colonoscopy techniques and improving training methods. The Unit is recognised as a World Centre of Excellence, the only unit in the UK to have been awarded this prestigious accolade by the World Organisation for Digestive Endoscopy (OMED).

Pushing the Frontiers of Patient Care

The Wolfson Unit for Endoscopy now wishes to create a state-of-the-art Colonoscopic Surgical Centre (CSC). This will set the future standard of care for minimally invasive surgery, ensuring the safe, effective and total removal of pre-cancerous and malignant polyps.

The CSC is St. Mark's Hospital's concerted and large scale response to the overwhelming need to increase the national provision of colonoscopic surgery, train more doctors in the most advanced colonoscopic surgical procedures and develop new patient care pathways, equipment, and innovative ways of working to deliver more effective, safer treatment for patients.

The CSC demonstrates St. Mark's commitment to push the frontiers of patient care and establish best practices that can be shared with the medical and surgical communities, through a dedicated programme of education and training.

Patients will be at the centre of the CSC and around them we will build a training and research facility which will allow us to look at new treatments and new innovations

The Masonic Province of Middlesex Charitable Trust is a much valued supporter of St. Mark's Hospital recent years. In April 2014, the Trust awarded £20,000 in order for The Wolfson Unit for Endoscopy at St. Mark's to

This item will assist in the successful and safe removal of polyps (mushroom-like growths that can become cancerous without early attention and treatment), early cancers and other lesions of the gastrointestinal tract. Polyp detection acts as a preventative measure, reducing the overall incidence of, and mortality to, bowel cancer within the population.

Since implementing bowel cancer screening in 2006, almost 4,000 polyps have been removed in St. Mark's bowel cancer screening centre. The introduction of flexible sigmoidoscopy screening

(a bowel screening programme for people aged 55 years and above) will result in approximately an additional 500 polyps removed annually in the screening centre.

The increased demand and referrals for endoscopy and its specialised procedures, means there is an increased need for equipment to ensure that efficient service delivery and quality patient care are maintained. Dr Siwan Thomas-Gibson, Consultant Gastroenterologist and Endoscopy Lead Wolfson Unit for Endoscopy, says, 'The Wolfson Unit for Endoscopy is delighted to receive this generous gift from the Freemasons of Middlesex. The Unit performs around 20,000 procedures per annum and this piece of kit is crucial in our daily work to reduce the incidence of bowel cancer. Undoubtedly, many thousands of patients will benefit from this important piece of medical equipment. We extend our sincere thanks to the Trust for its generous award.'

Desmond had been treated at St. Mark's Hospital for more than 40 years. With particularly aggressive Crohn's disease, he had struggled to lead a full and active life in the face of severe flare ups, multiple operations and many years of receiving powerful drug therapy. Whilst these gave Desmond respite from debilitating flare ups, they had very nasty side effects that compromised his health considerably.

Desmond refers to the day he was transferred to St. Mark's as



the best day of his life. Whilst his local hospital did not have the expertise to manage his complex bowel condition, at St. Mark's, his treatment was tailored to his unique health challenges. This has given Desmond many years of improved health as he has enjoyed remission and avoided powerful drug therapy.

In a gesture of great magnitude, Desmond has left instructions in his will that the majority share of his estate is to be gifted to St. Mark's Hospital Foundation for research into new and more effective ways of controlling Crohn's disease. Desmond has been inspired to leave a lasting legacy because he wants other patients to benefit from the same highly personalised care he received.


Brenda

Brenda suffered from Ulcerative Colitis. She benefitted from a surgical technique that was developed in the late 1970's by surgeons from St. Mark's. The ileal pouch-anal anastomosis or 'pouch' is accepted as the operation of choice for patients with Ulcerative Colitis and has been performed in more than 20,000 patients worldwide, radically improving the health of this cohort.

In recognition of the life changing treatment Brenda received, the result of translational bench to bedside surgical research, Brenda left a large, lasting legacy. This will enable researchers at St. Mark's to find new and better ways of preventing and treating Ulcerative Colitis, continuing an unrivalled tradition of research in this area.

History Corner ...

lthough the Hospital was originally founded in 1835 by Frederick Salmon, it was not until 1854 that the Hospital adopted its current name. It was on the 25th April of that year that the Hospital was officially re-opened coinciding with a traditional feast day of St. Mark the Evangelist.

It was therefore called 'St. Mark's Hospital for Fistula and Other Diseases of the Rectum'. As well as taking on the name St. Mark, the Hospital also took on the colour red which was derived from the official colour of the Feast Day in Venice, where roses are given out.

St. Mark's Hospital's griffin, or winged Lion, standing over a book is a traditional symbol of St. Mark, which symbolises courage. The book under the griffin's paw, reads "Pax Tibi Marce" (Peace be unto you Mark).

So the next time a friend asks why our Hospital uses a red "lion", correct them – it's the Griffin of St. Mark!

undraising is not always an easy d task; it takes time and persistence in the face of every-day pressures of work, hobbies and family life. But, after deciding to clear out their cupboards of bric-a-brac, a family from Cheltenham, Gloucestershire has managed to mobilise a whole online community to fundraise for St. Mark's Hospital Foundation.

Impressively, they have had over 335 customers and raised over £5,110 and an additional £710 in Gift Aid.

The online store is thriving, selling anything from DVDs to baby clothing with every purchase making a huge difference and contributing to the amazing total raised. All funds are to be put towards the tissue engineering research at St. Mark's, being led by a multi-skilled team which includes Dr Simon Gabe and Dr Tahera Ansari

Ayllah-Beau, aged 20, is a patient of Dr Simon Gabe, consultant gastroenterologist at St. Mark's Hospital. Chris says, "St. Mark's Hospital has been our back bone for the last year, supporting us through the fear and unknown of TPN, which Ayllah-Beau is reliant upon". TPN, short for Total

Parenteral Nutrition is when a patient is fed intravenously, bypassing the usual process of eating and digestion, with a special nutritional formulae of proteins, glucose, lipids, minerals and vitamins.

Chris goes on to explain, "The amazing Dr Gabe and his team have given us the confidence and support that was vital to us". Giving patients and their families support and confidence is vital when considering that the Foleys live around two hours away from Harrow, where St. Mark's Hospital is located.

By managing to run an entire online charity shop with over 335 customers and raising so much, Chris has shown her dedication to the cause but, as she says, it is because they are "eager to return our gratitude by supporting vital research". This dedication reaches far beyond Chris and her daughter, Ayllah-Beau, but to the whole online & offline community in Cheltenham, those running challenge events & those who are part of the online shop.

The support that the Foleys have secured is supporting research which hopes to create a future free from the fear of bowel disease. As Chris says, "St. Mark's has our full and continued support, which is the least we can do to repay their expertise, kindness and dedication."
