OUR SURGICAL ROBOTICS JOURNEY

In our 2018 newsletter, we described our plans to bring robotic surgery to St Mark's Hospital. This is the latest chapter in a long history of surgical innovation at the Hospital. With the support of both loyal and new donors, we reached the first milestone of our £2 million campaign to purchase the most advanced surgical robotics platform on the market, and the Hospital took delivery of a Da Vinci Xi surgical robot in spring 2018. 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SURGICAL ROBOTICS: 1 YEAR ON



WHY ROBOTICS FOR BOWEL DISEASE SURGERY?

We believe that the introduction of robotic surgery is an important milestone in reducing the risk of recurrent disease, and will provide patients with a good short and long-term quality of life. This is because it is a minimally invasive and a precise surgical technique that can help overcome several of the limitations of keyhole surgery.

With your support, St Mark's has entered the robotics era

The development of robotics for colorectal and anorectal surgery at St Mark's Hospital was introduced by Professor Omar Faiz, the Hospital's clinical director, and his predecessor, Professor Robin Phillips. It is an exciting step forward in the long history of surgical innovation and education at the Hospital. Mr Danilo Miskovic, an established robotics surgeon, was recruited to St Mark's Hospital's consultant staff in 2017 to lead the development of our Surgical Robotics Research Programme.

In November 2017, we launched a £2 million fundraising campaign to purchase a Da Vinci Xi Surgical System and fund the development of our Programme.

In the space of a few months, enabled by the generosity of both loyal and new donors, St Mark's Hospital Foundation reached the first campaign milestone, and took delivery of the most advanced surgical robotics platform on the market in March 2018. We are immensely proud to be able to train our staff using this new facility, the only surgical robotics platform in the UK dedicated to bowel surgery.

ACHIEVEMENTS IN OUR FIRST YEAR: APRIL 2018-MARCH 2019

RESEARCH: We are collaborating with the European Academy of Robotic Colorectal Surgery and the European Society of Coloproctology on international educational projects. We are also participating in the newly-formed UK Robotic Registry to contribute to a large national dataset. These partnerships demonstrate a recognition of St Mark's as a specialist bowel centre to develop a high-volume robotics programme. **CLINICAL:** We set ourselves the goal to perform 80 robotic colorectal operations in our first year and we exceeded this target. One of the cases was particularly unique; it involved 2 surgeons operating robotically on the bowel and the liver during the same operation. This was collaboration at its best, between St Mark's surgeons and Professor Long Jiao from Hammersmith Hospital, London.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING: We have achieved our internal training objectives early, and St Mark's will soon have 5 surgeons trained in robotic colorectal surgery. We are also training gynaecology, urology and maxillofacial surgeons within the London North West University Healthcare NHS Trust to ensure that the surgical robotics platform delivers maximum patient benefit. Intuitive Surgical is funding a robotic fellowship at St Mark's Hospital which will begin in 2019, training 6 surgeons in robotic colorectal surgery over the next 3 years.

A PIONEER OF SURGICAL INNOVATIONS FOR 200 YEARS

St Mark's was founded in 1835 as the world's first specialist bowel disease hospital. Since 1835, it has been at the forefront of surgical innovations that have saved lives and improved the quality of life of patients with complex bowel diseases. These innovations include the ileo-anal pouch operation, which is now the gold standard treatment of choice for aggressive ulcerative colitis. This was developed by surgeons from St Mark's in the 1970s.

More recently, St Mark's surgeons have developed novel, minimally invasive techniques for patients with early stage bowel cancer: FLEX, TASER and Speedboat. These techniques remove cancerous tissue with greater precision, and preserve more healthy tissue.

The development of robotics for bowel disease surgery is a natural progression for a hospital that has pioneered surgical innovation for 200 years.

Robotic surgery will be a significant part of the future of surgery, and the future is now.

ST MARK'S ABROAD

Following years of war and turmoil, Iraq appears to be gradually



returning to some semblance of normality. Dr Laith Al-Rubaiy, consultant gastroenterologist here at St Mark's, who graduated from the University of Basra as the first ranked medical graduate in the country, recently completed his fourth visit to the country. While there, he volunteered to see hundreds of patients in remote areas of Basra, visited a clinic built by British charity, the AMAR Foundation, and attended an international meeting at the Basra Medical School. Dr Al-Rubaiy says of his fellow medical colleagues "...despite all the difficulties and limited resources, they have managed to maintain their knowledge and pursue good quality research." He adds that, "There is still a huge amount of work to be done in this part of the Middle East, and Iraqis most certainly still need all the outside help they can get."

A WEEK IN THE LIFE OF ST MARK'S

Boasting over 180 years of expertise and achieving international recognition as a centre of excellence for the Wolfson Unit for Endoscopy research and training, St Mark's Hospital is unique in its expertise for both clinical and surgical care, as well as research and education into the treatment of complex bowel diseases.

If you follow us on our social media platforms, you might have seen that we have been exhibiting images, taken by St Mark's Hospital's Stephen Preston, of everyday life at the Hospital as part of our #ThisIsStMarks project. From research fellows writing their theses, to intricate live surgical procedures, bowel cancer screening kits and stoma nurses conducting their daily rounds, this project goes 'behind the scenes' and records the weekly lives of the experts who work in your national specialist bowel hospital.

UNBLOCKING OUTPATIENTS

St Mark's faces an increasing need to monitor outpatients with IBD. A service evaluation showed a mismatch between need and access. Two-thirds of patients were in remission, but those with acute symptoms were having trouble accessing help when they needed it. A plan was devised to offer telephone follow-up appointments to those at low risk of complications. Improvement science manager, Susan Barber, alongside consultant gastroenterologist Dr Naila Arebi and her team, worked with patients and clinicians and began to implement telephone clinics for patients who agreed to use the service. Susan Bailey-Fee, an IBD patient was on the project team. "The main advantage," she says, "is that if you're long-term stable, it isn't really necessary to go into hospital and see a consultant - you're losing a day off work and incurring travel costs just to be told...come back in 6 months." Dr Arebi says the "transformed" IBD outpatient service is now much more responsive to patients' needs, and believes the model could be replicated for other long-term conditions. Ms Barber says it is still early days but, if kept up, the service could be made 'business-as-usual' within the next few years.



THE ST MARK'S ACADEMIC INSTITUTE

St Mark's has embraced the education of others since the 1950s. Doctors come to St Mark's from all over the world to learn from our experts. The treatment of intestinal and colorectal diseases has become a specialty in its own right throughout the world, and St Mark's remains at the forefront, continuing to attract around 1,200 postgraduate visitors a year from around the UK and overseas. Many of these visitors return to their home country to establish a colorectal specialism. Since our flagship, annual 3-day congress, 'Frontiers', was established more than 15 years ago, we have educated and trained medical and other healthcare professionals from more than 40 countries, including Australia, South Korea, Sri Lanka and the United States of America. Our most recent congress presented a comparison of laparoscopic and robotic surgery techniques, using live video links to 2 surgical theatres simultaneously. The St Mark's Academic Institute has access to a wealth of highly qualified and experienced staff, and continues to provide a proactive attitude to colorectal education.

ALL THINGS RESEARCH



St Mark's Hospital and its Academic Institute supports and promotes a vibrant research ethos, with more than 20 research fellows undertaking either MDs or PhDs at any one time. Hirra Oppal, our research coordinator, supports our research fellows with anything from study set-up, facilitating

the ethical approval and budgetary processes, designing study plans and supporting funding applications to national governing bodies. Hirra also collates research metrics in order to constantly improve the reporting of research programmes at St Mark's, and she develops and manages relationships with other research institutions. "Every day brings a new challenge," she says. "My role has crafted me into a research 'jack of all trades'."

GENETICS RESEARCH: HOW A PATIENT HELPED OPEN UP NEW POSSIBILITIES

With an active and diverse research programme featuring a number of projects encompassing all aspects of intestinal and colorectal disorders, St Mark's attracts leading professionals, nationally and internationally. Isabel Martin, who has been awarded a Royal College of Surgeons of England



Research Fellowship, is just one of our specialist research fellows. Isabel works in the Polyposis Registry at St Mark's, and is undertaking a PhD on duodenal polyposis at St Mark's London. Her research aims are to evaluate the role of gut bacteria and genetics in cancer. Isabel requires significant funding in order to process all the samples she has collected from Polyposis Registry patients, to determine risk factors in cancer progression. The Foundation connected Isabel with a past patient who wanted to fund a genetics-focused project following a history of complex bowel cancer, which resulted in a 17-hour operation here at St Mark's 15 years ago. The patient met with Isabel to find out about the project and agreed to fund 2 years' worth of lab sample research, potentially opening up new possibilities in the world of genetics and bowel cancer.
