

At just six years old, Toby was diagnosed with Peutz-Jeghers Syndrome (PJS), a very rare polyposis syndrome that is usually inherited, although it can occur spontaneously. People with PJS develop polyps throughout the gut (anywhere between the mouth and the anus) which have

Toby has undergone dozens of operations to monitor and remove polyps. At least two of these planned and emergency operations have been life-saving.

In December 2017, Toby underwent a seven hour operation which involved the removal of four polyps, the longest one measuring 4.5cm. Toby's mum, Rachel, explains: 'St Mark's assembled a team of world leaders in this specialist field to perform the most difficult and precise surgery on Toby, doing everything they could to avoid open surgery which is associated with several complications, including death. It was only later that they told us how worried they had been for Toby.'



Toby recently celebrated his fifteenth birthday and, by way of thanks, Rachel completed a half marathon with family friend, Justine, and raised more than £850. Rachel's motivation was simple:

'I owe my son's life to St Mark's and his amazing team of surgeons and support staff....In addition to looking after his physical health, the team takes great care to ensure he is mentally prepared to manage his condition as he gets older. There are no words to thank them for the way they look after Toby and our family. I don't know where we would be without St Mark's. Toby is now a big, strapping lad of 6'2" and is enjoying a full, happy and healthy life. Toby's team has looked after him for the past nine years and they know him inside and out – literally!'
